As 5.1.2e explained in his mail, we just finished an assignment for the RIVM about the effect of face masks on risk behavior in public space (I attached the description).

Attached is our deliverable in the form of a short preprint of our preliminary results.

We have been working on extending the results into a scientific publication too, and are planning to submit that publication to a journal within a few weeks (we are close to have it done). When we submit the publication we will as a standard upload the pre-peer-reviewed version on a publicly available repository.

Please feel free to already now publicly announce our preliminary results. If you would like me to do it or to get involved in that process please let me know. Thanks for this succinct and clear presentation of results.

I have a few minor points that maybe you could address. I also think it would be useful if after processing those, we als our virology colleagues whether they have additional questions. To ensure the results are as relevant as possible.

Minor points:

- perhaps skip conclusions such as 'this is different than previously suspected' of this is not supported by an authoritative paper or policy document.
- some percentages can now be read as eg 11% of the people, whereas this also includes a time window in the coding (eg 30s). Probably good to include
- when possible, please include an absolute effect size incl 95%ci such as for the differences in risky face touching. Helps to evaluate degree of relevance
- when looking at distance, a key point has been in policy making this fake sense of security. I would mention that as well as that there are some studies suggesting distance increases (in an more experimental design). The study that may be most relevant to compare with this study is the Italian study om the side walks (rather than in cues?), which observed a quite large effect that we are clearly not seeing here.

We've just updated a literature review on these behavioural effects of face masks on our website, perhaps also check that document for useful references and potential limitations of this study and others. Would be useful to have the results being placed in the context of that literature if possible (perhaps a single paragraph on how this study relates to the larger evidence base?).
